

WASHINGTON, DC

CLAIM TO FAME

It may be compact, but the influence of Washington, DC looms large as the nation's capital. In addition to the White House residence and US Capitol, top-notch museums like those of the Smithsonian Institution and famous monuments such as the Lincoln Memorial offer plenty of opportunities for cultural and historical exploration.

From The Wharf — a lively development along the Southwest Waterfront — to the hip 14th Street corridor near Logan Circle, DC also boasts an assortment of eclectic neighbourhoods, ideal for experiencing the city's vibrant nightlife, booming restaurant scene and diverse entertainment.

MARK YOUR CALENDAR

Visitors from around the world flock to the capital city during the three-week-long National Cherry Blossom Festival (20 March-14 April), May brings Passport DC, a full month of festivities, during which DC's embassies open free to the public, honouring the city's many diverse cultures with street festivals, performances and more. Capital Pride (31 Mav–9 June) celebrates the LGBTO+ community with a free parade and multiple live-music events. Join the party in 2025 as the city hosts the international celebration of WorldPride (23 Mav-8 June). End summer on a high note with the smooth sounds of DC JazzFest at live performances at various venues across the city (Aug.-Sept.).

LATEST & GREATEST

In 2022, the National Air and Space Museum reopened its planetarium, museum store and eight renovated galleries, which offer digital and interactive displays and never-before-seen artefacts. including the WR-3 air racer. The National Museum of Women in the Arts reopened in 2023 with larger gallery spaces, a hands-on education studio and innovative technology. And you can now learn about (and meet!) the horses that protect the National Mall at The Horse Stables and the Wells Fargo **Education Center located near the** Korean War Veterans Memorial.

New shops and restaurants, including Gordon Ramsay Hell's Kitchen, await at the expanded waterfront Wharf. At The Rubell Museum, marvel at a growing collection of contemporary art and its inaugural exhibition *What's Going On*—190-plus social- and political-driven pieces. Rest and refresh steps from Union Station at The Royal Sonesta Capitol Hill hotel — a great option for those who love to explore on foot.

MARYLAND

CLAIM TO FAME

A perfect blend of cosmopolitan sensibilities and outdoor recreation make the Old Line State — its nickname referring to the Maryland Line soldiers of the American Revolutionary War — a can't-miss destination. Many of Maryland's key experiences are influenced by the Chesapeake Bay, from sailing and boating to beaches and enjoying signature blue crabs. Maryland's Eastern Shore is full of endless treasures and surprises, including the roaming wild horses of Assateague Island, gorgeous beaches and charming small towns like St. Michaels. The National Aquarium in Baltimore gives visitors an under-the-sea look at 20.000 animals in award-winning habitats.

MARK YOUR CALENDAR

The Maryland Folk Festival in Salisbury (20-22 Sept.) celebrates the rich diversity of American culture through food, art and music. It's a nonstop gathering with performances, workshops, parades, storytelling and more. Honour the legacy of one of Baltimore's most renowned poets at The International Edgar Allan Poe Festival (Oct.) with poetry and ticketed events. Meet the people behind the music at the Annapolis Songwriters Festival (Sept.) with dozens of artists performing throughout the city centre. In Frederick, watch gravity-defying cyclists speed through the streets in the only race of its kind in the USA: the National Clustered Spires High Wheel Race (13 July).

THE LATEST & GREATEST


In 2023, Great Wolf Lodge opened its new location in Perryville. This gargantuan indoor waterpark includes a lazy river. four-storev water treehouse and waterslides galore. The Crossvines, located in Poolesville's Agricultural Reserve, is a new facility created to promote vinicultural research. education and training while also functioning as a winery, casual bistro and tranquil retreat. The newly renovated CFG Bank Arena in Baltimore hosts everything from big-name country-music concerts to WWE Monday Night Raw wrestling with an enhanced bar experience and exclusive suites with all the perks.

VIRGINIA

CLAIM TO FAME

Home to eight US presidents and the first permanent English colony in the nation, Virginia is known as the Birthplace of America. The state's 42 state parks and numerous national parks boast amazing settings, from the scenic Appalachian Mountains in the west to long stretches of sandy beaches along the Atlantic coast. Shenandoah National Park, near Luray in the Blue Ridge Mountains, is a recreational gem covering 200,000 acres of protected lands.

The state also enjoys a robust wine country with 300-plus wineries and more than 50 distilleries to accompany its unique place in the country's whiskey history. And all of this is in addition to Virginia's reputation as the Oyster Capital of the East Coast.

MARK YOUR CALENDAR

Discover a range of beach adventures at the 50th anniversary of the Neptune Festival in Virginia Beach with oceanfront concerts, beer and wine tastings, a sandsculpting championship and Neptune's Surfing Classic (27 Sept.–6 Oct.). Celebrate the beauty of spring at the Shenandoah Apple Blossom Festival in Winchester (26 April–5 May) as you watch the parade, dance to live music, savour delicious food and drink, and cheer at sports competitions. Make Virginia's Historic Triangle (Jamestown, Colonial Williamsburg and Yorktown) ports of call in 2024 as Princess Cruises adds this historic stop in honour of the upcoming 250th anniversary of the USA and its revolutionary ideas. Special events will be held across the state through July 4, 2026, with the Historic Triangle acting as a major focal point.

THE LATEST & GREATEST

Try your luck at the new Hard Rock Hotel & Casino Bristol where slots and table games meet the fun, partying edge of the Hard Rock with delicious food and live music in the official birthplace of country music. Caesars Virginia is set to open a new resort casino in Danville in 2024, which will feature a full-service spa in addition to its world-class gaming floor.




FURNACE TOWN LIVING HERITAGE VILLAGE

Explore archaeological sites, hike riverside trails and take a guided tour of the MAC Lab. which houses more than eight million ancient artefacts. St. Leonard, Maryland

CROZET TUNNEL GREENWAY

Bring a torch for exploring this 1-mile (1.6-km) unlit tunnel in the Blue Ridge Mountains that was once part of a historical railroad. Afton, Virginia

Lose yourself to the enchantment of Appalachian bluegrass music with yearning fiddle riffs and cheerful mandolin solos at free afternoon concerts every day the centre is open. Galax, Virginia



SHIPWRECKS AT MALLOWS BAY PARK Enjoy

free entry and explore the "Ghost Fleet" — 100-plus World War I-era wooden steamships — via a low-tide kayak trip in the Western Hemisphere's largest ship gravevard. Nanjemoy, Maryland

A REGION RICH IN BLACK CULTURE & HISTORY

From confronting the nation's troubled past to the progress and discussions of the present, these destinations highlight the history and culture of Black Americans, paving the way for a brighter future.

WASHINGTON, DC

The Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture sits a short walk away from the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial along the National Mall. The museum, which is devoted exclusively to documenting African American life, history and culture, spotlights many fascinating and inspiring artefacts — like Muhammad Ali's robe and first-hand accounts given by Civil Rights activists.

DC's historic Anacostia neighbourhood is rich in Black history and home to the Frederick Douglass National Historic Site located at Cedar Hill, the estate of the famed abolitionist, writer and orator. The Smithsonian Anacostia Community Museum preserves the memories, struggles and successes of communities, illuminating and amplifying their collective power.

MARYLAND

Home to numerous sites along the Underground Railroad and the birthplace of iconic freedom fighters Harriet Tubman and Frederick Douglass, Maryland is the most powerful Underground Railroad storytelling destination in the nation.

Hundreds of freedom seekers escaped slavery along the railroad with the help of famed "conductor" Harriet Tubman. Explore their paths to freedom at sites like the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad Byway and the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad National Historical Park along the state's scenic Eastern Shore.

Follow Frederick Douglass' life on Maryland's Frederick Douglass Driving Tour, where you can explore the park and creek near his childhood home, his lecture sites and the jail where he was imprisoned.





VIRGINIA

Fort Monroe in Hampton is known as Freedom's Fortress for protecting freedom seekers during the Civil War. Nearby, Hampton University — one of the nation's top historically Black colleges and universities — is home to the oldest African American museum in the nation and counts Booker T. Washington among its many notable alumni.

Trace the footsteps of enslaved Africans and African Americans as you walk the solemn 3-mile (5-km) Richmond Slave Trail. In Richmond's Jackson Ward neighbourhood — known as the Harlem of the South — you'll find the Maggie L. Walker National Historic Site, home of the first female bank president in America, and the Black History Museum and Cultural Center.

ANNAPOLIS 🗆 🛱

Maryland's capital city is the gateway to North America's largest estuary, the Chesapeake Bay. A bustling port town in the 1800s, the home of the US Naval Academy is recognised as one of the top waterfront destinations in the United States and is world-renowned as America's Sailing Capital.

TRAVEL TIME FROM DC VIA BUS: 1h*

ARLINGTON 🐼 🛱 🚍 Virginia

Synonymous with the hallowed grounds of Arlington National Cemetery the final resting place of President John F. Kennedy — Arlington is just across the Potomac River from Washington, DC. Arlington offers plenty of urban features to take advantage of, including entertainment and dining complex Ballston Quarter, lush green spaces and hip neighbourhoods.

BALTIMORE 🚊 🚍 🏯

On the Chesapeake Bay's Inner Harbor, the city was backdrop for pivotal moments in American history, including battles with the British at Fort McHenry. Today it's known as one of the coolest destinations on the East Coast, with waterfront fun, cultural gems, diverse neighbourhoods and a hot culinary scene.

TRAVEL TIME FROM DC VIA TRAIN: 30 min*

CHARLOTTESVILLE 🗆 🛱 🛱

The Blue Ridge Parkway and Shenandoah National Park top the agenda in this scenic mountain town. On the historic Downtown Mall, dine at outdoor cafés, catch live music and peruse art galleries. Monticello, stunning home and gardens of third American president, Thomas Jefferson, is a must-see UNESCO World Heritage Site.

FREDERICK 🖳 🖳 🚍 MARYLAND

A prominent part of Maryland's involvement in the American Civil War, Frederick is home to several battlefields, heritage sites and the National Museum of Civil War Medicine. The cheery, walkable city centre brims with boutique shops and restaurants. Nearby, discover covered bridges, scenic wineries and picturesque national and state parks.

VIRGINIA BEACH

Find sandy beaches, a mild climate and fun like dolphin watching, surfing, kayaking, paddleboarding and fishing. The Chesapeake Bay, Atlantic Ocean and lush farmland give restaurants easy access to fresh seafood and produce. Back Bay National Wildlife Refuge's hiking trails and the Virginia Aquarium & Marine Science Center are top attractions.

WILLIAMSBURG

Stroll through America's beginnings — from the first permanent English settlement to the American Revolution's final battle — in the Historic Triangle, which is home to Jamestown Settlement, Historic Jamestowne, Colonial Williamsburg, the American Revolution Museum at Yorktown and Yorktown Battlefield. After your history lessons, take in the region's beauty while biking, fishing, hiking, horse riding and more.

FAMILY-FRIENDLY FUN

The region's variety of activities, many of which are rich in history and culture, make it a favourite destination for every member of your family.

PLAY OUTSIDE

Beautiful scenery and exciting things to do make for ample ways to enjoy the great outdoors. Virginia's Discovery Ridge **Adventure Center at Wintergreen Resort** in the Blue Ridge Mountains offers thrills for the family with a bungee trampoline. zip line, summer tubing and even a mechanical bull! In Maryland, venture to Kent Island and cycle the Cross Island Trail for inspiring views of the Chesapeake Bay. At Washington, DC's Yards Park easily accessible by Capital Bikeshare cycle or the Metrorail Green Line — splash in the dancing fountains, catch a concert or eniov an ice cream as you stroll alongside the Anacostia River.

STEP BACK IN TIME

There's no shortage of historical places and artefacts in the Capital Region. Learn about the history and culture of the Chesapeake Bay region at the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum in St. Michaels. Maryland, Explore life as an early American colonist at Jamestown Settlement. Tour a recreation of a Powhatan Indian village, the James Fort and ships that transported the colonists to Virginia in 1607. The extensive collection of Washington, DC's Smithsonian Institution alone would take weeks to explore. From pterodactyls and First Lady fashions to Gabby Douglas's leotard and the world's only remaining Sopwith Camel, travel through aeons of history at these 17 museums — for free!

TAKE IN CULTURE

Artistic expression abounds in the Capital Region. Discover four floors of hands-on exhibitions designed to inspire creativity and learning at Amazement Square in Lynchburg, Virginia. Paint on the walls, rock out on stage or create a rainstorm over the city. Watch kids exclaim over the magical illusions of the Community Bridge trompe l'œil mural at Carroll Creek Park in Frederick, Maryland. The National Building Museum in Washington. DC features a Building Zone where kids can drive a bulldozer, build a house and learn how engineers construct architectural wonders.

MUST-HAVE CULINARY EXPERIENCES

Michelin-starred restaurants, fresh-out-of-the-water seafood, regional Southern specialities, and eco-conscious farm-to-table cuisine — there are so many ways to treat your taste buds in the Capital Region.



GLOBAL CUISINE

With many cities across the region offering diverse dining options, you'll have your pick of global cuisines to sample. Washington, DC is home to the largest Ethiopian community outside of Africa, making the city one of America's foremost destinations for Ethiopian cuisine. The Adams Morgan and U Street neighbourhoods are home to some of the city's top Ethiopian restaurants. Eden Center in Falls Church, Virginia is a Vietnamese American strip mall featuring more than 30 authentic Vietnamese restaurants. Baltimore, Maryland's Little Italy is a community of Italian Americans who have lived there for generations, serving up their family recipes at restaurants throughout the neighbourhood.

SIGNATURE STAPLES

Savour the region's soul-food offerings at Black-owned restaurants like Ooh's and Ahh's in Washington, DC, Mama J's Kitchen in Richmond, Virginia or all-vegan Dodah's Kitchen in Baltimore, Maryland. Don't miss barbecued favourites like beef brisket and pulled pork at Black Hog BBQ Bar in Frederick, Maryland, Federalist Pig in DC's Adams Morgan neighbourhood and Myron Mixon's Pitmaster Barbeque in Alexandria, Virginia. Top it all off with a piece of peanut pie — a state speciality — from Virginia Diner in Wakefield. Or visit Boatyard Bar & Grill in Annapolis for a slice of Maryland's official dessert, the many-layered Smith Island Cake.

SENSATIONAL SEAFOOD

The Virginia Oyster Trail and Maryland Crab & Oyster Trail are terrific ways to taste the region's freshest coastal delights at multiple locations. No trip to the region is complete without a waterfront meal (or two). Enjoy stunning views as you dine from the patio at restaurants along the region's many waterfront destinations including Washington, DC; Annapolis, Maryland and Virginia Beach, Virginia.

FARM TO TABLE

You'll find an abundance of farm-to-table eateries thanks to the Capital Region's bounty of fresh fruits, vegetables, dairy products and ethically raised meats — all cherished by area chefs who highlight these locally sourced ingredients in innovative dishes. Prime examples include The Restaurant at Patowmack Farm in Lovettsville, Virginia, Chaia Tacos in Washington, DC and Elkridge Furnace Inn in Elkridge, Maryland.

MICHELIN STARS

The 2023 Michelin Guide to Washington, DC includes 122 restaurants and 37 types of cuisine in and around the nation's capital. Highlights include the guide's sole three-star establishment, The Inn at Little Washington located in the small town of Washington, Virginia, and two-star restaurants Jont, minibar by José Andrés and Pineapple & Pearls, all located in DC. Twenty-five restaurants in DC earned highly coveted Michelin stars while 29 restaurants received the Bib Gourmand honour. Be sure to pick up a copy of the latest version of the guide before your visit to dine at some of the DC metropolitan region's top-rated restaurants.

BREWERIES

ATLAS BREW WORKS Sip a craft beer at a 100-percent-solarpowered brewery, where an ever-changing tap list boasts a mix of flagship and seasonal brews. from the District Common lager to the Blood Orange Gose. Washington, DC

BURLEY OAK BREWING COMPANY

Locally sourced barley intensifies the flavours of draughts — like refreshing hibiscus wheat ales and pineapple-mango sours — at this bustling brewery with constantly rotating taps. Berlin, Maryland

LUXURY SHOPPING

High-end retail therapy is a favourite pastime of Capital Region residents. Maryland's The Collection at Chevy Chase, just outside Washington, DC, is an entire block filled with top designer shops such as Saks Fifth Avenue and Tiffany & Co. Virginia's Tysons Corner district is known as the "Rodeo Drive of the East Coast" due to the more than 400 high-end shops at Tysons Corner Center and Tysons Galleria. Encompassing several streets in the heart of DC, CityCenterDC's upscale mix of shopping includes Burberry, Dior, Gucci and more.

OUTLET MALLS & SHOPPING MALLS

With more than 10 premium outlet malls and dozens of shopping centres ranging from high end to budget friendly, you'll want to bring an extra suitcase. A 15-minute ride on the Potomac Water Taxi from DC will take you to Tanger Outlets National Harbor in Maryland, home to more than 80 shops. Equally close to DC, Arlington, Virginia offers a plethora of shopping options at the Fashion Center at Pentagon City and Ballston Quarter, both accessible via Metrorail.

UNIQUE BOUTIQUES

Just a few streets from the oceanfront, Virginia Beach's ViBe Creative District is a hub of artists selling their creations in quaint shops. DC's Georgetown neighbourhood is the destination for shoppers looking for a mix of indie speciality shops and designer boutiques. The 50-block historical city centre of Frederick, Maryland is filled with hundreds of one-of-a-kind retail finds all in a charming walkable area.

Local by Design in Annapolis, Maryland offers truly unique souvenirs from more than 100 local creative businesses. In Merchants Square, you can find shiny Jefferson cups at Danforth Pewter or browse the shops for everything from magnets and T-shirts to old-fashioned soaps and candles.

10 FAMOUS FILMING LOCATIONS

"THE EXORCIST" STAIRS

▲ Horror film fans will recognise many locales around Georgetown from "The Exorcist," including a distinctive ivy-laden staircase — the site of the film's climactic showdown, as noted by a plaque installed in 2015.

2 LINCOLN MEMORIAL REFLECTING POOL The National Mall has appeared in countless films, including "Forrest Gump." Who could forget Forrest and Jenny screaming each other's names as they splash into the reflecting pool?

3 SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION The museums are home to the second instalment of the rollicking "Night at the Museum" series. Embark on your own adventurous evening at one of the familyfriendly Smithsonian Sleepovers.

4 US CAPITOL This was the main setting for the landmark 1939 feature "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington." Filming wasn't allowed inside the building, so the US Senate Chamber was meticulously reproduced in Hollywood, California for the famous filibuster scene.

MARYLAND

5 JOHN WATERS' BALTIMORE Cult-classic director John Waters loves to showcase his hometown. Spots along 36th Street, locally known as "The Avenue," in the Hampden neighbourhood appear in "Hairspray," "Cry-Baby" and more. Don't miss Atomic Books, the local book shop where Waters receives fan mail. 6 "HOUSE OF CARDS" Though much intrigue in "House of Cards" happened in Washington, DC, Maryland was the primary filming location. The Underwoods' home is in Baltimore's Bolton Hill neighbourhood and Harford County masqueraded as Frank's quaint hometown of Gaffney.

7 CINEMA MAGIC IN BERLIN

This charming hamlet boasts nearly 50 buildings on the National Register of Historic Places. It was the backdrop for Julia Roberts' romantic comedy "Runaway Bride" and transformed into the turn-of-the-century setting for "Tuck Everlasting."

VIRGINIA

8 "HARRIET" IN RICHMOND Filmed at sites around the Richmond region including Berkeley Plantation in Charles City, Academy Awards-nominated "Harriet" tells the story of freedom fighter Harriet Tubman.

9 "LINCOLN" IN PETERSBURG Steven Spielberg's epic "Lincoln" was filmed entirely in Virginia. Old Towne Petersburg's octagonal City Market appears several times, as does the stately Union Station.

10 "DIRTY DANCING" AT MOUNTAIN LAKE

The iconic summer love story was filmed primarily at Mountain Lake Lodge in Pembroke. Plan a visit during one of the lodge's "Dirty Dancing"-themed weekends for a truly immersive experience.

10 SMALL-TOWN DISCOVERIES

MARYLAND

ST. MARY'S CITY Once Maryland's first capital, this is now the site of a living-history museum with a working tobacco farm, printing press and an active town centre.

2 EASTON In addition to cheery historical red-brick buildings, the twee city centre is home to antique shops, Amish markets, walking tours and the verdant Talbot Historical Society Gardens.

3 GRANTSVILLE Shop, snack and watch cheese being made at locally loved High Country Creamery & Market. Dive into area history at Grantsville Museum and stay at the historical Casselman Inn.

4 SAVAGE Peruse antiques, books and souvenirs at Savage Mill — an artisan mall housed in a 19th-century textile mill with a nearby walking trail. Then savour classic American comfort foods at Ma's Kettle. 5 HAVRE DE GRACE Visit the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum to learn about duck-hunting history and marvel at the artistry of duck decoys before enjoying fresh seafood with Chesapeake Bay views.

VIRGINIA

6 DANVILLE Angler's Ridge mountain-bike trail system thrills with 35-plus miles (56-plus km) of fun while several museums enthrall visitors with hands-on science exhibitions, tanks and more.

7 CAPE CHARLES The adorable, blue-roofed Peach Street Books in this beach town is a must-visit. At Kiptopeke State Park, kayak around nine partially sunken concrete Ghost Ships lined up just offshore. 8 LEXINGTON At Boxerwood Nature Center & Woodland Gardens, whimsical artwork mingles with various ecosystems to inspire environmental enthusiasts. Catch a film at Hull's Drive-In Theatre once the sun sets.

9 WYTHEVILLE A giant pencil on Main Street, a gas-station museum (Great Lakes to Florida Museum) and beautiful panoramic views from the 100-foot-tall Big Walker Lookout make Wytheville delightfully Instagram friendly.

CULPEPER At Belmont Farms Distillery, try the "moonshine" — a high-proof grain alcohol that was once brewed at night (hence the name). You can also visit the tasting rooms of several area wineries and breweries.

DUCUTATION MARYLAND Head **Control Control C**

MOUNTAIN MARYLAND Head for the rugged Allegheny Mountains and aim your lens at the rushing Muddy Creek Falls or the famed Lover's Leap.

2 *MARYLAND HISTORIC NATIONAL ROAD Take a selfie on the water's edge at Baltimore's Inner Harbor or with wine in hand at a picturesque Mount Airy vineyard.

3 CHESAPEAKE & OHIO CANAL Bike or paddle along Maryland's "Grand Old Ditch," travelling past top sites like the Paw Paw Tunnel and DC's Georgetown neighbourhood.

4 JOURNEY THROUGH HALLOWED GROUND Snap some of America's most historic sites, including the Civil War battleground of Cedar Mountain and President James Madison's Montpelier estate.

5 *CHESAPEAKE COUNTRY Kayak pristine bay waters and stop in charming fishing villages like Chestertown, Maryland to capture postcard images of Colonial homes and red-brick town squares.

6 *HARRIET TUBMAN UNDERGROUND RAILROAD

Point your camera at historical sites — from one-room schoolhouses to wildlife refuges — along this network of secret routes and safe houses used by African American freedom seekers.

7 SKYLINE DRIVE Take in the beauty of the Blue Ridge Mountains, with breathtaking views of Virginia's sweeping Shenandoah Valley and the storied Appalachian Trail. 8 *COLONIAL PARKWAY Journey through 400 years of Virginia history, where fascinating sites like Historic Jamestowne, Colonial Williamsburg and the Yorktown Battlefield come into frame.

9 *BLUE RIDGE PARKWAY Be wowed by the spectacular scenery of the Appalachian Mountains, including the panoramic Peaks of Otter and restored Mabry Mill.

10 *GEORGE WASHINGTON MEMORIAL PARKWAY Explore the Washington, DC area and discover the camera-ready National Mall and historic Mount Vernon presidential estate and museum.

RICHMOND, VIRGINIA

Virginia's forward-thinking capital city has more than 900 restaurants and nightclubs, including Babe's of Carytown, a hot spot for drinks, volleyball and dancing. Delve into Richmond's dynamic LGBTQ+ arts and entertainment scene at a show by Richmond Triangle Players, the only performing arts group in the mid-Atlantic dedicated to LGBTQ+-themed theatre.

ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA

Alexandria's historic streets are not just charming, but also inclusive and welcoming. With more than 80 hospitality businesses committed to LGBTQ+-friendly policies, the city has received numerous accolades from LGBTQ+ organisations and publications. Beautifully preserved 18th- and 19th-century architecture is the perfect setting for the city's many independent restaurants, boutiques and galleries.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, VIRGINIA

Gay pride abounds in Charlottesville, where you can find locally sourced American fare, billiards and a chic dance club at Rapture Restaurant & Nightclub or live music with a side of salsa at LGBTQ+-ally Cinema Taco. Support LGBTQ+-owned businesses with a hearty meal at Moose's by the Creek.

WASHINGTON, DC

Dupont Circle is renowned for its eclectic eateries, book shops and gay nightlife, while Adams Morgan's Pitchers and A League of Her Own are lively LGBTQ+ sports bars. Don't miss Capital Pride in June, a multiday celebration that draws more than 250,000 people.



FREDERICK, MARYLAND

The annual Frederick Pride festival and a growing roster of LGBTQ+-owned businesses make this city a worthwhile stop. Get your groove on at The Lodge in nearby Boonsboro, where drag and burlesque shows pack the club every evening.

BALTIMORE, MARYLAND

Charm City is known as being the home-town inspiration of LGBTQ+ icons like John Waters and Divine. Each June, the city spends an entire month celebrating Baltimore Pride with an array of parades and events in almost every neighbourhood. Year-round, you'll find inclusive and welcoming venues along with weekend Drag Queen brunches at various locations.

MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL

The Washington Nationals and Baltimore Orioles — Capital Region's Major League Baseball teams — both take the field at stadiums in scenic neighbourhoods where soaking in the sunshine with a beer in one hand and a hot dog in the other is a quintessential American pastime. Season: April-October

NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

The country's most intense fan bases emerge each autumn for America's version of football. You'll catch the fever, too, when you experience the hard hits, miraculous diving catches and end-zone celebrations of the Washington Commanders and Baltimore Ravens.

Season: September–January

NATIONAL BASKETBALL Association

See the flamboyant dunks and gravity-defying alley-oops of DC's NBA and WNBA teams. The Washington Wizards (NBA) put on their spectacular show at Capital One Arena whilst the Washington Mystics (WNBA) play at Entertainment and Sports Arena. Season: October-April and May-September

NASCAR

Head to Virginia and feed your need for speed with the intense drama of stock-car racing at Martinsville Speedway's paper-clip-shaped raceway in the mountains of Ridgeway, the massive Bristol Motor Speedway, and Richmond Raceway, whose recent infield redevelopment project added a viewing walkway so fans can get a closer look at all the action.

Season: February–November

NATIONAL Hockey league

In the 2018 season, the Washington Capitals won the coveted Stanley Cup for the first time. And they're still proving themselves on the ice, having reached the play-offs for eight consecutive seasons. Attend a riveting home game at Capital One Arena in DC's city centre. Season: October-April

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER & NATIONAL WOMEN'S Soccer League

DC United — the most decorated club in America's football (or "soccer," locally) scene — and the Washington Spirit professional women's club — whose roster is stacked with players of the 2023 Women's World Cup — show you what the US version of the sport is all about. Wear your red and black (or red and blue) to cheer the teams on.

Season: March–October

GO EXPLORE: NATIONAL & STATE PARKS

KENILWORTH PARK & AQUATIC GARDENS WASHINGTON, DC

WHY YOU SHOULD GO: Hike past peaceful ponds filled with croaking frogs and sunning turtles and go birding on a boardwalk that leads to a lush marsh, where you can watch flocks of wading shore birds as they hunt for food.

MAGICAL MOMENTS: Visit early in the morning from late June through July to see the park's gorgeous water lilies and lotus flowers spectacularly open up for a few hours before the midday heat forces them to close once again.

ROCK CREEK PARK WASHINGTON, DC

WHY YOU SHOULD GO: With more than 32 miles (51 km) of trails to explore, Rock Creek Park is a true oasis in the city. Visitors can also discover American Civil War fortifications, a 1765 house and a mill from the early 1800s.

MAGICAL MOMENTS: Be wowed by the night sky in the planetarium or during evening stargazing sessions, held April through November.

PATAPSCO VALLEY STATE PARK MARYLAND

WHY YOU SHOULD GO:

Maryland's oldest state park is known for its 200 miles (322 km) of scenic trails, where you can go hiking, mountain biking and horse riding. Head down to the Patapsco River and do some fishing or go canoeing too.

MAGICAL MOMENTS: As you travel through the park keep an eye out for historic ruins, like the Elk Ridge Furnace that reportedly produced cannons and ammunition during the Revolutionary War, and the former riverside mill town of Guilford.

SWALLOW FALLS STATE PARK MARYLAND

WHY YOU SHOULD GO: Home to Maryland's tallest waterfall — Muddy Creek Falls — as well as several other cascades, this mountain park is a nature lover's dream. Hike or bike alongside river rapids, through thick forestland and into neighbouring Herrington Manor State Park.

MAGICAL MOMENTS: Escape into the serenity of the woods to listen for birdsong. Try to catch sight of the Blackburnian warbler — recognisable by its fiery orange throat and dappled black and white body.

SHENANDOAH NATIONAL PARK VIRGINIA

WHY YOU SHOULD GO:

Skyline Drive leads to awe-inspiring views of the Blue Ridge Mountains and the world-famous Blue Ridge Parkway. Hike part of the famous Appalachian Trail and look for the nearly 200 bird species found in the park — you might even spot deer or black bears.

MAGICAL MOMENTS:

Stay overnight in a rustic cabin so you can enjoy sunrise and sunset in the mountains.

NATURAL BRIDGE STATE PARK VIRGINIA

WHY YOU SHOULD GO:

Feel the magic of this park as you walk under the massive 215-foot limestone arch of Natural Bridge, estimated to be hundreds of millions of years old. Follow the riverside trail to Lace Falls, a tumbling waterfall that's the perfect backdrop for pictures.

MAGICAL MOMENTS:

Relax under twinkling stars as park rangers and astronomy volunteers teach you about the night sky on special Dark Sky Night programmes.



NEIGHBOURHOODS TO KNOW



WOODLEY PARK

A leafy green retreat in DC, Woodley Park is bordered by the Smithsonian's National Zoo, home to animals like giant pandas and American bison. Sprawling Rock Creek Park also borders the neighbourhood, perfect for a day of hiking, biking or horse riding in the city.



U STREET

This lively sector could be considered the part of DC that never sleeps. As a nightlife hub, music venues are plentiful. It's even the birthplace of famed jazz musician Duke Ellington, and is steeped in African American heritage.



PENN QUARTER & CHINATOWN

Hip restaurants pepper this area east of the White House, complete with world-renowned museums and theatres. A massive arena and plenty of architecture examples complete the district.



IVY CITY

Once an industrial area and a horse-racing track, this cosy neighbourhood is now a happening food and drink scene with numerous craft distilleries and two Michelin-recognised restaurants. It's also home to the U.S. National Arboretum, a vast expanse of beautiful gardens.



📕 🛱 Foggy Bottom

Just north of the National Mall, this neighbourhood is home to cultural venues, diplomats and outdoor enthusiasts. Stretching along the Potomac River, there are also opportunities for biking and running.



SOUTHWEST WATERFRONT

Much of the activity here centres on the water, from river cruises to riverside restaurants. A revitalisation effort has made The Wharf development a vibrant destination for dining and entertainment.



GETTING Around

The Metro (the region's underground rail and bus system) is considered the best way to get around Washington, DC and reaches destinations in Virginia and Maryland, including Alexandria, Arlington, Fairfax, Rockville and Silver Spring, Consider these other options, as well:

- Metrobuses connect destinations not served by the Metrorail
- DC Circulator bus system along six routes
- Bike sharing on 100plus miles (161-plus km) of bike lanes
- Taxis and ride-sharing apps like Uber and Lyft
- Walkable avenues that lead you past famous landmarks

 a spicy regional sausage, mustard, onions and home-made chilli sauce on a steamed bun.

Catch a show at The Howard Theatre. The historical venue has hosted greats like Duke Ellington and Lena Horne and brings phenomenal performers to the city to this day.

Owned by Sheila Johnson — one of the first Black female billionaires — Salamander DC offers luxurious accommodations along the city's Southwest Waterfront.

DAY 3

Begin at James Madison's Montpelier in Virginia where The Mere Distinction of Colour exhibition tells a holistic story of America's past. Then, head to Thomas Jefferson's Monticello for The Life of Sally Hemings exhibition to learn about one of the most famous African American women in US history.

The Jefferson School African American Heritage Center in Charlottesville features a permanent historical exhibition and a rotating contemporary art gallery, along with hosting numerous events highlighting the city's African American history and culture.

■ For dinner, relax with a comforting meal at Soul Food Joint or Mel's Cafe, both locally owned and specialising in the traditional cuisine of America's South.

URBAN WATERFRONTS

Explore two states and the capital city on this tour as you hop on cruising water taxis and riverboats to see highlights of Washington, DC, Maryland and Virginia all in one trip.

DAY 1

Have a leisurely lunch of fresh bivalves at DC's Rappahannock Oyster Bar. Then, head to The Wharf to explore shops, parks and bars. Afterwards, drop into The Municipal Fish Market to watch people haggle over freshly caught seafood.

Cruise 45 minutes to Alexandria, Virginia on a scenic water taxi ride. Set on enchanting King Street, Vermilion is a locally loved eatery known for its farm-totable menus. In the evening, take in a performance at The Birchmere, an intimate concert hall that has featured music legends like Johnny Cash to Esperanza Spalding.

DAY 2

Ride the trolley down Alexandria's King Street for scenes of the waterfront, historical buildings and shops. Housed in a former industrial plant, the Torpedo Factory Art Center overflows with creativity. Find artists' studios, galleries and even workshops. At Virtue Feed & Grain, enjoy regionally sourced American fare in a charmingly repurposed 1800s feed house.

Hop on a water taxi to National Harbor, Maryland to end your day. Marvel at the pinks and reds of sunset along with the lights glistening on the water from the top of The Capital Wheel.

Book a room at MGM National Harbor, which boasts Las Vegas-style gaming, a 3,000-seat theatre and dining options from acclaimed chefs like José Andrés.

DAY 3

Score epic bargains on designer brands at Tanger Outlets National Harbor. Afterwards, take advantage of the National Harbor Circulator bus to return to the waterfront.

At Succotash, sample traditional dishes of the American South with Korean influence from acclaimed James Beard Award winner Edward Lee. Then, take a post-lunch stroll on the boardwalk to admire murals, statues and other public art, including *The Awakening* — a dramatic metal sculpture of a giant emerging from the ground.

Catch a boat for a delightfully windswept ride back to DC. Round out your adventure by exploring The Wharf at night: Take in a concert at The Anthem or savour the coastal fare at Del Mar.

SEA TO SUMMIT

Take in the full variety of the Capital Region's landscapes — from cosmopolitan urban offerings to gorgeous sandy beaches to rolling mountains draped in dense forestland.

DAY 1

Settle into the city and get inspired for your adventure by summiting DC's highest point — the Washington Monument — for panoramic views of America's capital.

Pedal a boat around the Tidal Basin to see more of the city's impressive marble monuments by water.

DAYS 2-4

Stay and play at the Capital Region's best beaches for a few days. Start with Ocean City, Maryland's boardwalk: it offers miles of walkable fun, like roller coasters, arcade games and live entertainment.

Make your way to Assateague Island National Seashore to camp on the beach and watch wild ponies trot through the waves.

In Virginia Beach, Virginia, stroll the 3-mile (4.8-km) boardwalk — home to many restaurants and nightly summer concerts — and learn to kayak or charter a fishing boat.

Ocean View Beach Park in Norfolk is the perfect place for picnics, concerts, sunsets or long strolls along the shoreline before a dinner of fresh seafood.




DAY 5

■ Head west towards Waynesboro, Virginia where you'll feel the cool mists of the Blue Ridge Mountains as you cruise the famous Skyline Drive through Shenandoah National Park. The 105-mile (169-km) roadway winds through the mountains with more than 70 scenic overlooks and plenty of opportunities to hike. In Front Royal, the northern endpoint of Skyline Drive, find caverns, museums, wineries, historical sites and more.

DAY 6

Revel in the allure of Maryland mountain towns in Cumberland, marvelling at the Allegany Museum's 50,000-plus historical artefacts or chugging along the Western Maryland Scenic Railroad.

MAJOR AIRPORTS Washington Dulles International Airport (IAD)

Washington Dulles International Airport is the international and domestic gateway airport to Washington, DC and the greater Capital Region. This major travel hub supports domestic and international air travel on 42 airlines to 74 domestic and 61 international destinations, including 42 world capitals.

Washington Dulles is connected to the Capital Region via dedicated roadway and features a new Metrorail train station. The Silver Line provides fast and frequent service connecting Washington Dulles to the Capital Region. Not only is the Capital Region's Metro system one of the most expansive in the country, but it's also one of the most affordable. The maximum one-way fare is \$6 between any two points on the system on weekdays and \$2 on nights and weekends.

Washington Dulles has efficient customs clearance and security processing, thanks to numerous innovative technology features like Global Entry, self-serve Passport Kiosks, TSA PreCheck and biometric screening via CLEAR and VeriSCAN.

Aside from being a world-class travel facility, Washington Dulles offers fantastic amenities and is committed to a diverse arts programme that includes rotating exhibitions, public-art displays and live performances — all for the enjoyment of passengers. The airport also features a wide variety of local and brand-name retail shops, including multiple duty-free shops, spa services and award-winning restaurants from such celebrated chefs as Wolfgang Puck, Michael Symon and Geoff Tracy.

GETTING AROUND

METRO

The DC Metrorail system covers the DC area plus nearby towns in Virginia and Maryland, including Washington Dulles International Airport. Metro SmarTrip® fares range from \$2–\$6, depending on the time of day. The Metrobus takes you from Metro stations to many convenient stops around DC, Maryland and Virginia. See the website for timetables and routes *wmata.com*. Certain Metro stations might be impacted by an ongoing Metro improvement plan. Visit *wmata.com*/ *safetrack* to help plan your trip. Maryland's MARC train service (*mta.maryland.gov/marc-train*) and Virginia's VRE rail service (*vre.org*) connect to DC daily and on weekdays, respectively.

BIKE SHARE

The Capital Bikeshare programme

(capitalbikeshare.com) is a network of 5,000 bicycles at 700-plus stations across DC: Arlington, Alexandria, Falls Church and Fairfax County in Virginia: and Montgomery County and Prince George's County in Maryland. Rental options start at \$8 for 24 hours, but three-day and 30-day usage is also available. Pick up a bike and pedal to wherever your plans take you, with the ability to return your ride at any station nearby.

CAR RENTAL

Travel on your own schedule by renting a car from companies in major airports and larger cities. If you're staying in Maryland or Virginia, or travelling outside of Washington, DC, a rental car makes sense.

In Washington, DC and adjacent areas, neighbourhoods are pedestrian-friendly and affordable public transportation is readily available. For a short trip outside the city, consider renting a Zipcar (*zipcar.com/dc*), available by the hour or day. Although not required, drivers are advised to get an international driving permit before the trip. Sample car rental rates (prices vary by pickup location): compact (\$74/day), standard (\$80/day), full-size (\$113/day), luxury (\$133/day), plus taxes and fees.

TAXIS

Taxis can be hailed on busy streets or at hotels and other landmarks; dispatch may also be called ahead of time to arrange pick-up. Find approximate taxi rates and fees at *dctaxi.dc.gov*. Tipping 15% to 20% is customary.

Uber and similar services are available in many locations.

GETTING TO THE CAPITAL REGION BY AMTRAK

Amtrak trains (*amtrak.com*) include comfortable standard and business-class seats, sleeping cars and glass-domed observation cars. The Acela Express and Northeast Regional routes take you quickly to major East Coast cities such as DC, Baltimore, Richmond, Norfolk, Philadelphia, New York City and Boston, as well as Charlottesville, Lynchburg, Newport News, Roanoke, Virginia Beach (via coach transfer) and other cities within the Capital Region.

WHEN TO GO

The Capital Region has a generally mild and pleasant climate, so you can enjoy indoor and outdoor activities throughout the year. Late summer tends to be hot and humid, so spring and autumn are ideal for sightseeing.

A RANGE OF SEASONS In summer, high temperatures in Virginia Beach reach about 30°C and it's warm enough to swim. In winter, western Maryland highs are generally a chilly 1°C, perfect for winter sports.
